

- There is a rich body of knowledge out there and we can readily access it.



- •A good artist will see another artists' style and then try and emulate that style as closely as they can.
- •A great artist will select elements from other artists work and incorporate it into their own unique

mix of influences.

PLAGIARISM HAS ALWAYS BEEN A PROBLEM

There is absolutely nothing wrong in getting inspired, motivated or influenced by existing works out there. It is encouraged to get references for academic and creative projects.

There is everything wrong presenting someone else's work as if it is your own original work.

We as lecturers must do more to draw a fine between being inspired and outright plagiarism.

CONCLUSION

The overriding concept of **stealing like an artist** is not only applicable to creative arts.

<u>All academics</u> need some form of *inspiration and direction* to kickstart their projects. Existing body of knowledge (*images*, *videos*, *articles*, *books*, *etc.*) would always be needed for motivation.

Let us educate our students that as they get 'content' for their projects, they must remember to be GREAT ARTISTS. Not just copy the references but use them as a starting point to create new experiences... while referencing the sources accordingly in the process.
