Collaboration of the C4SS + postgraduate librarian was formed, to address the writing and referencing challenges.

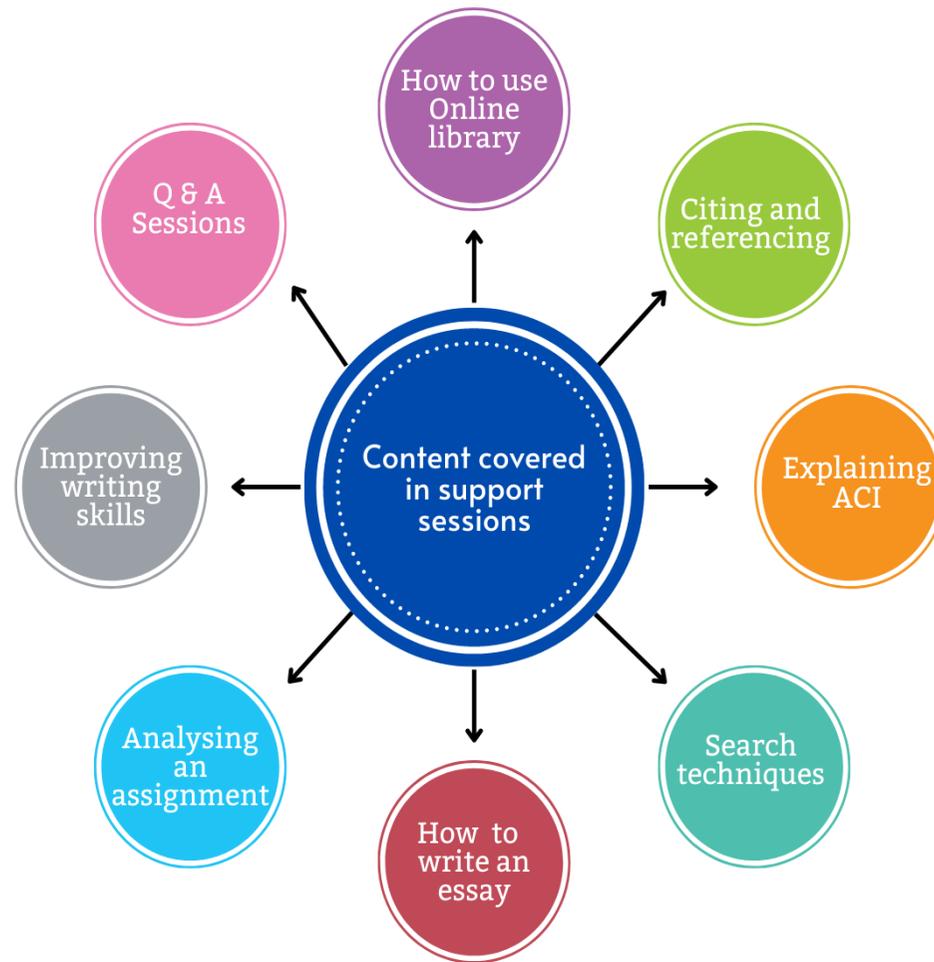

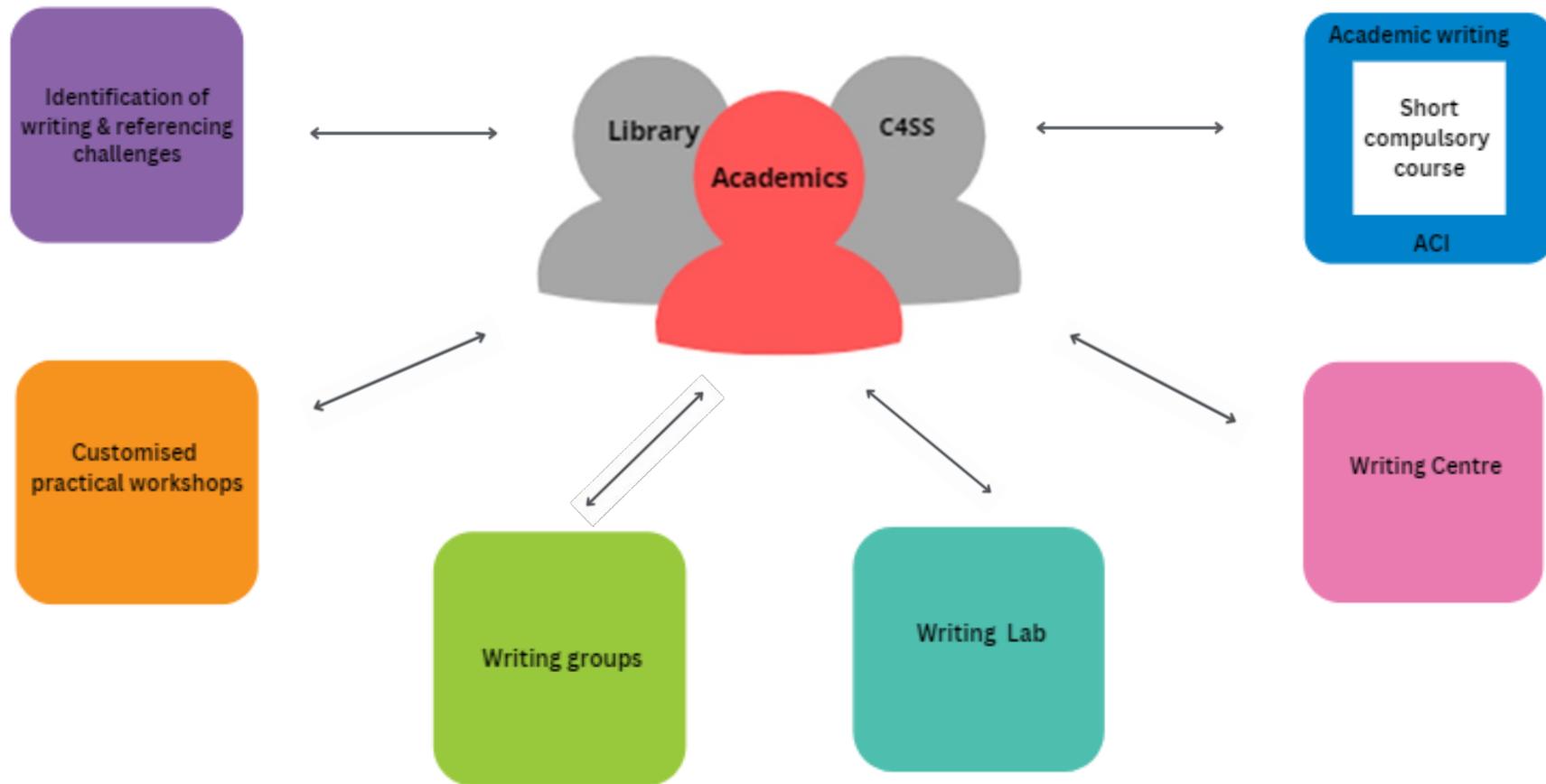

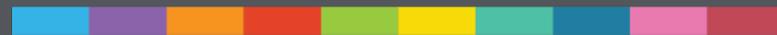
**Short compulsory course on academic writing and referencing including Academic Integrity Course**
